PUBLIC INPUT SOUGHT

ON MASTER PLAN

Grosse Pointe City is inviting the public to learn more about its 2022 master plan update and offer their own suggestions about the future of the community.

A workshop with activities and information will take place from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Feb. 12 at Grosse Pointe Unitarian Church, 17150 Maumee Ave. — across the street from City Hall.

"We're looking forward to our first public engagement event on Feb. 12," City Planner John Jackson, of McKenna Associates, said during a Jan. 24 Grosse Pointe City Council meeting.

In addition, a survey on the community's future can be completed by visiting mcka.mysocialpinpoint.com/grosse-pointe-master-plan; alternatively, printed copies of the survey can be picked up at the front desk of City Hall. Surveys must be completed by March 5.

A third opportunity for the public to weigh in is through a comment map and digital forums, in which people can pin their "likes," "dislikes" and "ideas." These opportunities are available on the master plan website, the same site where people can complete the survey.

Officials say they hope to get as much public engagement as possible on the master plan update, as the plan directs decisions about parks, housing, infrastructure, economic development and more.

## Student journalists to be honored
